Over 550 youth from across Canada will compete in over 40 skilled trades and technology contests for the opportunity to reach the pinnacle of excellence and be named national champion in their chosen field. WorldSkills Member Countries and Regions Gathered in Abu Dhabi for Competition Preparation Week

This past January, over 300 delegates from WorldSkills Member countries and regions gathered at the Abu Dhabi Centre for Vocational Education and Training in preparation for the 44th WorldSkills Competition. This included planning meetings with competitions committees, skills management teams and partners. There were also several meetings to discuss the implementation of the WorldSkills strategy and the 2025 vision.

In addition, the One School One Country Programme was launched as students from 59 local schools welcomed representatives of the WorldSkills countries and regions. The launch of One School One Country included an elaborate and colourful dance by more than 50 schoolgirls from the United Arab Emirates. Children and teachers then took the stage to announce which school would be paired with which Member. Skills Canada will be paired with Hamooda Bil Ali School. On October 12, 2017, the students will meet the competitors from their matched team to learn about each other and their cultures, while increasing international awareness of vocational skills.

The countdown is on for the 23rd Skills Canada National Competition, which will take place May 31-June 3, 2017, at the <u>RBC Convention Centre</u>, in the vibrant city of

Winnipeg, Manitoba. Known as the "cultural cradle of Canada," Winnipeg is Manitoba's cosmopolitan capital city.

The Skills Canada National Competition (SCNC) is the only national, multi-trade and technology competition for students and apprentices in the country. This year, more than 550 young people from all regions of Canada will come to SCNC to participate in over 40 skilled trades and technology contests in six sectors including construction, employment, information technology, manufacturing and engineering, services and transportation.

By providing a forum where Canadian youth can compete at the national level, SCNC provides hands-on experience related to skilled trades and technology careers. Through these competitions, Skills/Compétences Canada seeks to raise the awareness of the skilled trades and technology sectors to Canadian youth and their influencers.

SCC encourages local schools to visit the SCNC to view the many career opportunities that are available to youth and also experience hands on learning with various Try-A-Trade® and Technology activities. These activities enable visitors to put their skills to the test and get a feel for the trades. Participants will complete small projects that expose them to components of various trades, such as bricklaying, electrical wiring and cooking, just to name a few.

As always, admission to the Competition is free and it's open to the public.

The Countdown is on for WorldSkills Abu Dhabi 2017!

The WorldSkills Competition, held every two years, is the biggest vocational, education and skills excellence event in the world that truly reflects global industry standards. The competitors representing the best of their generation are selected from skills competitions held in 76 WorldSkills member countries and regions. The 44th WorldSkills Competition will take place from October 14-19, 2017, at the <a href="https://dx.doi.org/no.com/n

WorldSkills Abu Dhabi 2017 is expected to be the largest WorldSkills Competition yet, with 1,300 competitors from 60 member countries and regions who will be competing for the title of world champion. There will be over 50 skill competitions, in six sectors, including Construction and Building Technology, Creative Arts and Fashion, Information and Communication Technology, Manufacturing and Engineering Technology, Social and Personal Services and Transportation and Logistics. The 44th WorldSkills Competition will be the biggest event ever held at ADNEC, attracting more than 100,000 visitors.



At the 2016 Skills Canada National Competition, the highest-ranking age eligible medalist in each applicable skill area were selected to participate in the WorldSkills Canadian Trials, which were held in January, February and March of 2017. Having reached pre-established Canadian standards, 31 competitors were named to WorldSkills Team Canada 2017 and will compete in the upcoming 44th WorldSkills Competition. 2018 Skills Canada National Competition



Donor Support Helps Manufacturing Grad Qualify for Trades and Technology International Competition

It's safe to say Silas Meeches has turned out to be a good investment.

With the help of several donor-supported awards and bursaries from Red River College (RRC), Meeches, 20, graduated with his Manufacturing Technician diploma in May 2016. Now, he's busy prepping for the 2017 WorldSkills Competition in Abu Dhabi, an event he describes as "the Olympics for trades and technology students."

Meeches first qualified for the event in June 2016 when he won a silver medal (in CNC Machining) at the Skills Canada National Competition in New Brunswick. Before nationals, he won gold in the Skills Manitoba Regional Competition hosted at RRC.

Originally enrolled in the College's Precision Metal Machining certificate program, Meeches didn't feel it was a good fit for his skill set. He credits Manufacturing Technician co-ordinator Rob Ataman for pointing him to a program where he could thrive.

"From what I've heard [Rob] has always been a big help to students, and I was no exception," says Meeches. "There was a lot of pushing in the right direction. I'd say 'I don't know if I can do this,' and he'd say, 'I know you can.'"

That's not to say Meeches lacks in self-motivation. Despite graduating in the spring, he still spends the bulk of his time refining his trade in RRC's machine shop. With the WorldSkills Competition slated for October 2017, Meeches has a few months to train for the event.

"I'm making sure I understand all the programs, all the materials, all the dimensioning, all the stuff I've been doing for the past few years," he says. "Everything has to be perfect."

While a student at RRC, Meeches' tireless work ethic earned him the Sadvik Coromant Award, the Ted M. Konyk Bursary, the Gene Haas Bursary and the H. C. McGregor Merit Award.

A graduate of Sisler High School, Meeches says he developed that work ethic while playing with the North Winnipeg Nomads Football Club.

"It was in bantam level that I saw I could be good at the sport if I put a little bit more extra work into it, and that carried into high school," he says.

"When I got into metal shop in high school I found I was putting more effort into there then I was into anything else. I thought I was supposed to be the football kid, but I started morphing more into a trades guy. When I first got to [RRC], I said 'OK, let's put in the effort that I've always been putting in,' and then a couple people helped me out. I thought 'OK, I can't fail,' and I started to go the extra mile, found more in the tank. I started putting in more and more work, which led me to here."

Meeches' hard work has already taken him places. In November of this year, he

made his way to Gothenburg, Sweden for the EuroSkills competition, where he competed in an unofficial capacity and gained practice time with the equipment he'll use in Abu Dhabi.

While admitting he is nervous during competitions, Meeches said he manages to keep his cool.

"Something I've learned to do here at Red River College is to trust myself," he says. "In the competitions, you can start second-guessing yourself because of the time limit and all the people watching you and making comments like 'What was that sound?' You ask yourself, 'Did I do this right? Did I do that wrong?' but at the end of the day, you have to trust yourself."

Meeches said his confidence in competition has already caught the attention of a few potential employers.

"They see it as, 'He can work under stress. He can work under tight deadlines. He can make sure we hit our targets, so when the time comes, he won't flinch,'" Meeches says.

Every year, hundreds of students just like Meeches receive financial awards that make a real difference in their lives. Many of them tell us they would not have been able to continue with their studies had they not received a scholarship, bursary or award to help cover their costs.

Apprenticeship: A Positive Start

Choosing a career path can be daunting. Considering that your income potential will usually align with your education level, post-secondary options must be weighed carefully. Competition to enter the workforce is also increasing, and with this, the expectations of employers. As a result, more youth are seeking additional education to distinguish themselves. However, College and University tuitions are higher than ever and can present additional challenges for graduates as they enter the workforce already straddled in debt. Recent reports have revealed that the average student debt in Canada was over \$25,000.00 in 2015. (National Post reported on the Canadian University Survey Consortium. Also, Globe and Mail informed that a Statistics Canada report revealed that in 2012, 28.3 Billion was owed in student loans.)

In light of this, Apprenticeship provides an appealing option for many reasons, but most notably because graduates of these programs are not burdened with debt upon

completion. The phrase, "earn while you learn" is commonly used to market the potential of Apprenticeship and in Canada; the government also provides financial incentives to participants.

Apprenticeship programs in construction can range from Carpentry to Plumbing and everything in between. The government recognizes the need for these trades and the importance of maintaining a structure that ensures the passage of knowledge from generation to generation. The qualifications of those that complete Apprenticeships are highly regarded and sought after by employers.



United Association Canada is a union of piping professionals that include HVACR techs, Plumbers, Steamfitters/Pipefitters, Sprinklerfitters and Welders. We have been involved with Apprenticeship in every aspect with relation to the pipe trades since they were first named under Apprenticeship regulations. These careers are challenging, but equally rewarding. With the support system that we have formed in unison with our contractors, our members have the highest completion rates in the country. They depend on us and we plan for success.

They may begin as Apprentices, but many members acquire the skills to fill a variety of future positions such as teacher, foreman, superintendent, owner and a host of others. Many of them will make million dollar decisions on billion dollar jobs sites. The sky is the limit.

While there may be many options after high school, Apprenticeship provides recognition of qualifications, pride of skill and a debt free start to your journey. We welcome you to the challenge.
