With this knowledge, the competitor will be made aware which essential skill may require improvement. Full implementation is expected in the next Skills Canada National Competition.

- **3.2** Tasks that may be performed during the contest
 - Clean and prepare vehicle panels for paint application⁷
 - Mix and apply undercoats and topcoats¹
 - Refinish various substrates⁷
 - Perform minor damage repair⁷
 - Prepare and refinish auto body panels⁷
 - Remove surface paint defects⁷
 - Colour matching utilizing paint manufacturer paint chips⁸
 - Colour tint to a blendable match¹
 - Create a colour without formula⁷
 - Masking for refinish⁷
 - Decal/paint protection film application⁷

4 EQUIPMENT, MATERIAL, CLOTHING

- **4.1** Equipment and material provided by Skills/Compétences Canada
 - Waterborne and solvent technology from (to be annonced), will be used for this competition. All clear coat and single stage products will be low V.O.C.
 - SATA spray guns (undercoat and topcoat)
 - Electric polisher
 - Work tables and stands
 - Protective equipment other than personal protective gear (PPE)
 - SATA fresh air supplied respirators
 - Paint suits
 - Environmental controls
 - Sanding equipment, blocks and palm sanders
 - 3M automotive products for automotive repair and refinish

COMPETITORS WILL BE REQUIRED TO USE THE MATERIAL AND EQUIPMENT PROVIDED BY SCC. ALL OTHER MATERIAL AND EQUIPMENT WILL BE REMOVED FROM THE SKILL AREA.

- **4.2** Equipment and material provided by the competitor
 - Half mask respirator: organic vapour, with documentation of valid fit-test pass (must be clean shaven to compete)

4.2.1 Toolboxes Guidelines

One of the objectives of SCC is the sustainability of the Competition. As a result, the toolboxes brought by Competitors will be restricted to the items in section 4.2 only. There is no exception to this rule. If the Competitor brings other tools, they will be removed and will not be used during the competition.

5 SAFETY REQUIREMENTS

5.1 Safety workshop

Upon arrival at the Skill area, Competitors will participate in a Safety workshop and they will be expected to work and maintain a safe working area during the competition. Any Competitor breaking any health, safety and environmental rules, may be subject to penalty and disgualification from the competition.

5.2 Personal protective equipment (PPE) provide by Skills/Compétences Canada

- Hearing protection
- Fresh air respiratory protection
- Hazardous spill kit
- Nitrile /latex gloves
- Lint-free paint suit

- CSA approved safety shoes
- Glasses with side shields
- Half mask respirator: organic vapour, with documentation of valid fit-test pass (must be clean shaven to compete)

7 CONTEST SPECIFIC RULES

Contest specific rules cannot contradict or take priority over the Competition Rules. They do provide specific details and clarity in areas that may vary from contest to contest. Any additional contest rules will be reviewed during competitor orientation.

Spray Booth	Fresh air supplied respirators must be worn by all competitors in the spray booth at all times



8 ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

8.1 Interpreter

If a competitor requires the help of an interpreter once onsite during the competition, the Skills/Compétences Canada Provincial/Territorial offices must advise Skills/Compétences Canada National Secretariat a minimum of 1 month prior to the competition or this service might not be guaranteed.

8.2 Ties

- Tiebreaker #1: The competitor with the highest score in the Paint & Masking criteria will be declared the winner.
- Tiebreaker #2: The competitor with the highest score in the Prepping/ Priming criteria will be declared the winner.
- Tiebreaker #3: The competitor with the highest score in the Polishing/ Chip Protection Film/Decal criteria will be declared the winner.

8.3 Test Project change at the Competition

Where the Test Project has been circulated to Competitors in advance, NTC shall change a minimum of 30% of the work content. Please refer to the Competition Rules.
