Furthermore, SCC partnered with Let's Talk Science to engage students in career discovery and exploration in the Let's Talk Careers Competition, on the ChatterHigh platform. During this competition, students learned about the diverse and rewarding careers in the skilled trades, technologies and STEM (science, technology, engineering, and mathematics).

SCC has continued to work closely with industry, government, and education partners to inform Canadian youth of the many interesting careers that exist within the skilled trades and technologies. SCC provides a unique platform where Canadian youth can explore the diverse career pathways through our many events and programs. SCC's Member Organizations, located in each province and territory across Canada, continue to do excellent work as they connect with thousands of youth throughout the country each year through their programming.

We are extremely grateful to have dedicated volunteers and partners who make it possible to host impactful events each year and engage the next generation of skilled workers. - The Essential Skills were spotlighted during SCC's Experience of Digital Skills in several videos. SCC also featured some of the exciting and dynamic careers that are available in the technology sector throughout the week.
- A few Skills Canada Alumni showed off their talent in a

special video series featuring job skill demonstrations of their Skill Area, and shared testimonials where they recounted their skills journey. In addition, as part of SCC's RBC Foundation Alumni Series, SCC's CEO Shaun Thorson interviewed the members of the National Alumni Committee as they shared how they got involved in skills competitions to how they continue to spread the word about the skills movement.

Students Engaged in Career Exploration and Discovery During Let's Talk Careers Competition

 Talk Science to offer an exciting opportunity to engage students in career discovery and exploration. Schools and students across Canada had the chance to earn while they learn by participating in the Let's
 Talk Careers Competition, on the ChatterHigh platform.
- The first round was held in the Fall of 2020. During this competition, nearly 6,000 participants from 200 schools across Canada explored over 444,900 career and post- secondary pathways, and earned over \$25,000 in cash prizes.
- The Let's Talk Careers
 Competition engaged students across Canada in career discovery by engaging them in exploring existing and emergent careers in skilled trades, technologies and STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics).

 While participating in this



competition, students learned about career and postsecondary options available to them by matching their passions and interests to post-secondary programs or directing them to work options.

 Students across the country had the opportunity to answer a 10 question quiz each day to earn points towards their personal leaderboards and for their school. These quizzes allowed them to explore thousands of career options that they may not have been exposed to and also the opportunity to win prizes and bursaries.

SCC Celebrated *Digital Skills* During NSTTW 2020



- National Skilled Trade and Technology Week (NSTTW) is a key date in the annual Skills/
 Compétences Canada (SCC) calendar. The goal of this week-long event is to promote and host awareness raising events around the many career opportunities in skilled trades and technologies in Canada. During NSTTW organizations from across Canada get involved with SCC to promote skilled trade and technology careers to youth, parents and the public. NSTTW 2020 took place from November 1 7, 2020 across Canada and the official event hashtag was #NSTTW2020.
- This year, Skills/Compétences Canada presented a fun and engaging social media campaign for NSTTW 2020 in place of our usual face-to-face events due to Covid-19 restrictions. Fittingly, the Essential Skills theme for 2020 was *Digital Skills*. SCC reached over 209,217 people on social media during NSTTW 2020.

The launch also included a fun and exciting Kahoot Challenge which tested the participants' Essential Skills and their knowledge of the skilled trades and technologies.





Essential Skills Highlights



Skills/Compétences Canada highlighted the nine Essential Skills (ES) throughout the year in their programs, activities and events. SCC developed several online sessions to highlight the Essential Skills during its Digital Experience of Skills, National Skilled Trade and Technology Week and Level Up! With Skills Canada. The nine Essential Skills were also highlighted during ES Day and SCC's Back to School Campaign.

SCC Celebrated Essential Skills Day

SCC partnered with ABC Life Literacy to celebrate ES Day on September 24th, 2020. Essential Skills Day is an annual initiative which takes place each September to raise awareness about the importance of workplace literacy and essential skills training. SCC shared interviews, posts, and resources on their social media channels to bring awareness to literacy and Essential Skills using the following hashtags #ESD2020 #The9AtWork #EssentialSkills #SkillsForSuccess.

SCC Launched an Essential Skills Back to School Campaign to Highlight Essential Skills Day

SCC participated in a social media initiative aimed at promoting the Essential Skills program in conjunction with Essential Skills Day where participants were invited to Tweet, Facebook a Post, or Instagram a story about how they use Essential Skills (ES) at work, school, or everyday activities using the hashtags #ESD2020 #The9AtWork and #EssentialSkills #SkillsForSuccess.

This campaign highlighted the importance of the nine Essential Skills commonly used in schools and the workplace that help young Canadians understand which skill they may need to focus and improve on, as well as how Essential Skills are important for students, apprenticeships and careers in the skilled trades and technologies.

SCC's Digital Edition of Skills 2020

Essential Skills Youth Assembly (ESYA): In these inspiring videos, Skills/Compétences Canada (SCC) reconnected with their past ESYA participants to see where they are now and discussed their experience as a participant and how they put their Essential Skills to use. The ESYA provides a venue for young adults, aged 18 to 22, to discuss current trends in skilled trades and technologies.

Essential Skills Talks: These sessions were facilitated by Alex Musial, Event Management & Consulting, via Zoom and featured a series of guests who discussed the importance of Essential Skills in their respective industries, in education, and the emerging importance of

employability within the Essential Skills framework.

Essential Skills and Recruitment:

This session featured panelists from Strongco, UA Canada and PCL Construction who discussed the Essential Skills and recruitment. These industry leaders shared insights with students and adults looking to enter (or re-enter) the workforce about how the workplace is changing, and what employers look for during interviews and in resumes.

Education and Learning:

Essential Skills Forum: This year's theme was 'Making Skills Accessible' and featured several online interviews hosted by Chris Gallant from Skills Canada Nova Scotia (SCNS), a leader in disability inclusion. The Essential Skills Forum serves as an opportunity to bring education and industry together to discuss the skills gap as it relates to the importance of educating youth on the nine Essential Skills and how they relate to skilled trade and technology occupations.

National Skilled Trade and Technology Week 2020

Introduction of this year's theme - Digital Skills:

SCC introduced *Digital skills*, one of the nine Essential Skills, in an informative video. Digital skills are needed to understand and process information from digital sources, use digital systems, technical tools, and applications. Digital sources and/or devices include cash registers, word processing software, and computers to send emails and create and modify spreadsheets.

Essential Skills Chats with Chris and Cat: ES

Thursdays returned for a second season and featured Skills Canada Nova Scotia's Chris Gallant and his beloved cat. This season kicked off with an entertaining clip on the service industry and highlighted the top three Essential Skills that are necessary for cooks! This included oral communication, numeracy and thinking.

Essential Skills at Level Up! With Skills Canada 2021

Essential Skills Talks: This special edition of ES Talks with Alex Musial, Event Management and Consulting featured Essential Skills discussions with six sectors of skilled trades and technologies, the importance of Essential Skills and how industry has had to pivot during the pandemic. Several of SCC's industry experts and alumni discussed their sector in these informative videos.





Essential Skills, Literacy, and Apprenticeship: This discussion featured Mack Rogers from ABC Life Literacy, Randy Lindsay from Futureworx, and Kaesy Russnak from Bow Valley College who discussed the importance of supporting literacy skills and socio-emotional skills for the workplace and how these skills are crucial for Apprenticeship completion and success in skilled trade and technology careers.

Essential Skills Accessibility and Inclusion: This inspiring session featured keynote speaker Marco Pasqua who shared some of his personal experiences as a person with a disability in the technology sector, what it was like to build a business from the ground up and the importance of the nine Essential Skills as we move towards the future of inclusive workplaces across Canada.



SCC Embraces New Essential Skills Framework





The nine Essential Skills have been updated to reflect our changing world, skills requirements, and evolving workforce. Although still essential, the updated framework is now called **Skills for Success**, as these are the skills needed to participate and thrive in learning, work and life. This framework was updated by the Government of Canada and was initially expected to launched in the Fall of 2020 during Essential Skills Day. A lot of

work went into the research and development of the new Framework and this look longer than expected. The new **Skills for Success** model officially launched on May 18th, 2021.

Skills for Success include skills that are foundational for building other skills and knowledge and important for effective social interaction. These skills overlap and interact with each other, and with other technical and life skills. They are inclusive and can be adapted to different contexts.

Skills for Success are for everyone – youth, employers, workers, training providers, governments, and communities.

The changes are as follows:

Document use – no longer stand-alone

Digital – remains the same

Numeracy – relevant numerical elements of Document Use have been added i.e. blueprints interpretation

Reading – relevant reading elements of Document Use have been added i.e. reading forms, charts, labels

Writing – relevant writing elements of Document Use have been added i.e. filling out forms and charts

Problem Solving – now a standalone skill, updated from Thinking

Adaptability – NEW

Creativity and Innovation - NEW

Collaboration – updated from Working with Others

Communication – updated from Oral Communication

He also participated at the WorldSkills Americas Competition in 2012 as part of his training for the 44th WorldSkills Competition, in Leipzig, Germany.

Bo shares that the skills competitions he competed in have helped him to get out of his comfort zone by meeting new people and travelling to new places. Bo has remained involved with skills by volunteering for several Skills Canada National Competitions over the last few years in many key roles. He was also a trainer in Mobile Robotics for WorldSkills Abu Dhabi 2017 where he had the opportunity to coach his younger brother. Bo has his Journey Person in Instrumentation and currently works as a Control Systems Specialist at a potash mine. He enjoys trouble shooting and problem solving any issues that arise. During his free time, he keeps himself busy with hobbies such as 3D printing, disc golf, and smoking meat.

His advice to youth is "Do your research when you're looking for a career that you'd like to pursue. Try to match your current skill set and interests with a job that sparks an interest in you, and don't be afraid to learn new skills. Be willing to continue learning and improving your skills throughout your career", said Bo.


Alumni Survey Interim Results






