However, to ensure competitors are respected during competition time, a code of conduct applies. In other words, no photography or filming of a competitor should take place that may interfere with or hinder the performance of the competitor in the competition.

In Addition

- Media may take photos and film from outside the Skill Areas during the competition.
- Media can enter a Skill Area only during breaks in the competition with the permission of the Chair of the National Technical Committee (NTC) for that Skill Area. Specific 'shots' or 'angles' are to be organized in discussion with the Chair or NTC media member, and the competitor. Steel toe shoes/boots are required to enter the contest area. Steel caps are available for media at the Media Centre located beside the main entrance.
- The NTC media member for each Skill Area will be identified with a fluorescent wristband.
- No media can communicate with a competitor without the permission of the NTC Chair or the NTC media member.
- No media is to enter the 'personal space' (i.e. do 'close-ups') of a competitor without the permission of the NTC Chair or NTC media member.

WHO WE ARE

Based in Ottawa, Ontario, SCC is the Canadian Member Organization of WorldSkills. Its unique position among private and public sector partners enables us to work toward securing Canada's future skilled labour needs while helping young people discover rewarding careers.

WHAT WE DO

SCC offers experiential learning opportunities including skilled trade and technology competitions for hundreds of thousands of young Canadians through regional, provincial/territorial, national and international events, as well as skilled trades awareness programs such as the Skills Canada National Competition and National Skilled Trade and Technology Week. A lack of information regarding the opportunities in trades and technologies currently prohibits many young Canadians from considering a career in the skilled trades and technologies. SCC brings these occupations to the forefront to make them more visible for teachers, students, parents and the general public. Many programs highlight the 9+1 Skills for Success, which are crucial skills in careers today.
